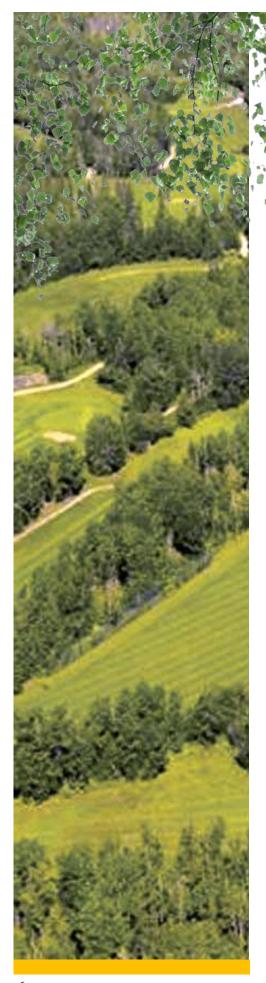

Parents can play a huge role in helping children deal with anxiety

### Helping kids cope in an emergency

- Take their fears seriously and tell them "it's okay to be scared."
- Explain the events as best you can and acknowledge what's frightening about what happened.
- Tell your kids what you think and feel. Doing so helps them feel less alone if they know that their feelings are similar to yours.
- Maintain familiar routines, like mealtimes and regular bedtime hours.

### Fire Behaviour Triangle

Of the three sides of the fire behavior triangle weather is the most variable and the least predictable.

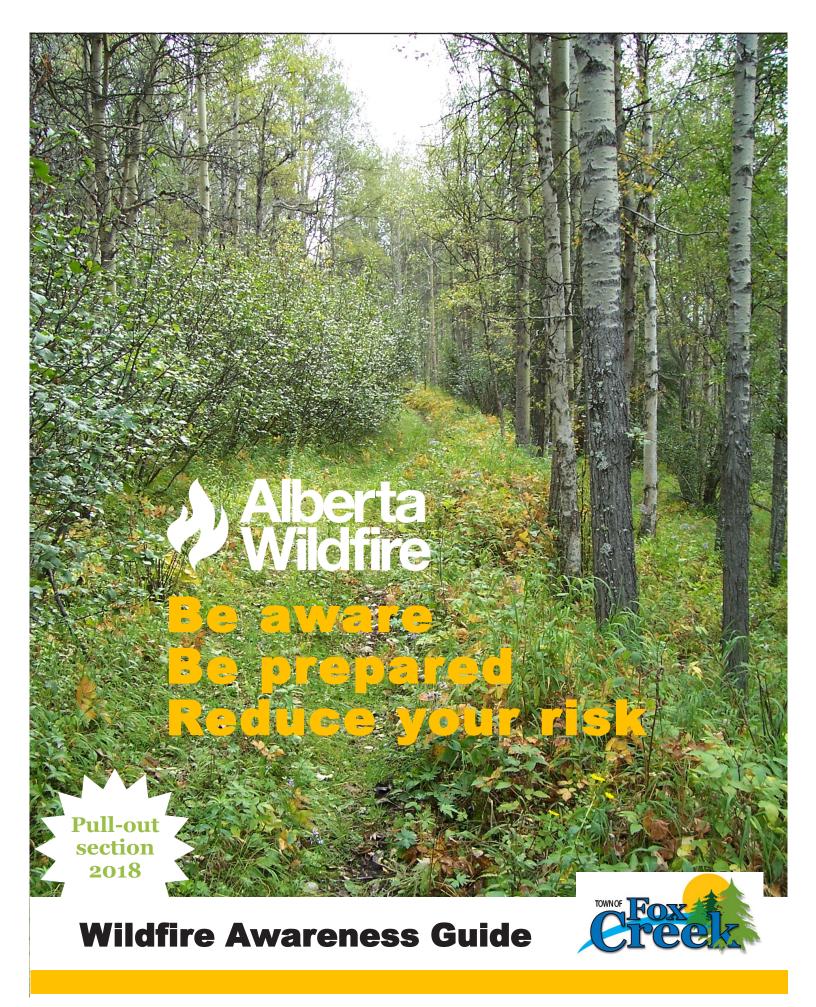
It is one of three components considered by firefighters when controlling or predicting wildfire behavior. It is critical to know the current and forecasted weather conditions.

Trees, shrubs and undergrowth provide fuel. Vegetation management reduces vegetation density. Knowing the type, stage and condition of vegetation growth is important.

Topography, the lay of the land, plays a role in determining where, and how quickly, fire may spread.

### **Incident Command: Resources on the Ground**

Alberta Agriculture and Forestry has 10 forest management areas located across the province. Fox Creek and the surrounding areas are within the Whitecourt Forest Area.

Each Forest Area has one fire centre which conducts local wildfire prevention and operations. The fire authority inside the town of Fox Creek is the local Fox Creek Fire Department, outside the town, the Alberta Agriculture and Forestry.

Wildfires don't respect municipal or provincial boundaries, and will move from wildland into urban settings, and vice versa. Strong tactical leadership is essential.

The agency taking command of an incident determines how, when and with whom information, responsibilities and resources are shared. Command assignment is based on where the wildfire originated and where it is currently burning. If a wildfire starts on crown land, Alberta Agriculture and Forestry will responsible to supress the wildfire If it were to cross over onto town land, a Unified Command would be started. This would allow town officials to work with Alberta Agriculture and Forestry to set priorities and objectives for the wildfire incident.

In recent history, this exact situation happened on the 2016 losegun Lake Wildfire. The wildfire was on crown land and immediately Alberta Agriculture and Forestry began work with the M.D. of Greenview and the Town of Fox Creek.

Agreements and plans exist between the Town of Fox Creek and Alberta Agriculture and Forestry. One such agreement is the mutual aid agreement. The

> agreement provides for information exchange and cross training prior to a wildfire, and for resource sharing in the event of an incident, regardless of where it starts.

> Wildfire managers continuously monitor and coordinate between the fire centres to ensure the right amount of resources, for current conditions, are in place.

> Conditions can change quickly. Recently, the

willdfire danger ranking in our area rose from LOW to HIGH in a matter of days. Large areas of exposed, dead, dry grass along roadways, and

### Look out Towers: Eyes in the Sky

The province of Alberta has a network of 127 strategically located lookout towers across the province. They have been in use for close to 100 years. The towers are manned from spring to fall and account for 40 per cent of all wildfire detection. Each tower has an area view of over 5,000 square kilometres (a circle radius of 40 kilometres); slightly smaller than the size of Prince Edward Island!

There are nine look out towers located across the Whitecourt Forest Area. Typically, towers are opened in April, when the snow pack has reduced enough to expose significant areas of dead, dry, flammable vegetation. This natural spring-time cycle increases the wildfire danger ranking.

In addition to the towers, firefighters also use helicopter patrols to survey the vast forested landscape stretching from Fox Creek, north to Swan Hills and south to Whitecourt. Patrols will range in frequency depending on environmental conditions. Patrols increase especially after storms pass through an area - looking for lighting started wildfires, and when the wildfire danger is higher due to periods of hot, dry weather.

The forest is our firefighters' office, and they need a place to rest. The Fox Creek Fire Base is a "home away from home" for wildland firefighters. It too opens in early April, but can open earlier depending on the wildfire danger ranking.

The number of firefighters and equipment on site changes depending on the wildfire danger. As the danger ranking increases around the Fox Creek area, so does the number of firefighters, equipment, and aircraft.

In the Fox Creek Planning Area, a 10 kilometre radius around town, wildfire danger ranking is high to extreme during the spring and fall, and ranges from low to high during the summer; 47 human caused wildfires and 12 lightning fires have occurred in the last 15 years.

Industrial activity and recreation opportunities increase potential for human caused ignition. However, their presence aids significantly in prompt wild-fire detection and reporting.

Tony Tower (2002)

A ground survey was performed in October 1954 to set a location for Tony Tower.

Construction of the original 80 foot tower was completed in 1956. It was moved to its current location for the 1958 fire season after it was discovered the Tower Ridge was at a slightly higher elevation.

The first entry in the tower registry was on March 28, 1956 when R.J. Naylor (Chief Ranger in Whitecourt) and A.N. Sturko (Chief Ranger at Pine Ranger Station)

the forecast for warm, dry, windy conditions account for the change.

Alberta Agriculture and Forestry work continuously throughout the year with the Fox Creek Fire Department and town officials, to plan, review, train, and prevent wildfires by helping to implement the FireSmart program.

In the spring, the Fire Department helps to carry out a hazard reduction burns. The main goal of the project is to remove the dangerous build-up of grass in the area, helping to prevent the occurrence of a wildfire near the community.



Last wildfire season, the Whitecourt Forest Area had 29 wildfires that burned 11.44 hectares

These totals are below the five year average and were mainly due to a wet spring, when the majority of wildfires happen.

Firefighters also had help from those working and enjoying the forest who prevented or reported wildfires by calling: 310-FIRE (310-3473)

### FireSmart: Fox Creek Wildfire Mitigation Strategy

Wildfire is an important element of the natural ecological cycle; it has helped shape Alberta's landscape for generations. As communities and industry become more intertwined with Alberta's forests, the risk of wildfire grows significantly.

FireSmart uses proactive, preventative action to minimize wildfire effects to urban areas and infrastructure while balancing the benefits of wildfire on the landscape. It is living with, and managing for, the unwanted effects of wildfire.

Community members, community leaders, forest companies, industry and government all have responsibility to lessen the risk and impacts of wildfire. The Town of Fox Creek is no exception.

The Fox Creek Wildfire Mitigation Strategy outlines specific wildfire concerns and includes 13 FireSmart recommendations in six categories:

- **1. Public Education** through information sharing, engagement, and participation in Community Recognition Programs..
- **2. Emergency Response Plan** review and update to reflect best practices.
- **3. Development** of water sources, advisory signage, and provision for disposal of yard and construction debris.
- **4. Legislation** bylaw review.
- **5. Cross Train** emergency personnel in wildland/urban interface tactics and the Incident Command System.

**6. Vegetation management** reduces potential fuels through the removal, or the planned, controlled, reduction burns of encroaching high-hazard vegetation by trained professional firefighters.

The 2018 Fox Creek project was planned jointly by Alberta Agriculture and Forestry, Fire Department. and the Town.

Timing will depend on when conditions are appropriate. This project involves a right of way south of the highway, reinforces the vegetation management recommendations, and solidifies the highway as a manmade fire break.

## Alberta Wildfire

"The Town of Fox Creek has done a lot of work in and around the community to mitigate the negative impact of a wildfire. All of these mitigation activities decrease the impact of wildfire but do not eliminate the risk.

Home owners also need to do their part to reduce the risk on private land and residences. It is important that everyone help to prevent wild-fires when they are working, and recreating, in the Alberta forests this summer."

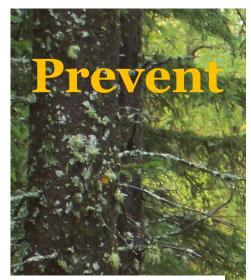

# Alberta Wildfire

### Predicting the occurrence of wildfire

Weather stations around the province measure "winter" precipitation levels (October 31 to April 1).

The data allows forestry meteorologists to calculate the spring starting drought code. Most of the Whitecourt Forest Area has a low 2018 spring drought code.

However, winter precipitation, does not predict wildfire probability. Regardless of the snowfall amounts, it is the snow melt, exposing dead, dry grasses and branches, that creates the hazard and raises the danger ranking.

Wildfire Danger Rankings often escalate quickly, until green-up in the late spring, early summer, when vegetation has completed its new growth flushing.

Long-term weather forecasts are unreliable, so it is hard to predict what the spring, or summer, will bring.

Influencing weather factors:
Temperature
Precipitation
Humidity
Lightning
Wind velocity and direction

Vildland fires also create their own weather.

### If you are advised to evacuate:

- windows closed and have your valuables already packed in your car. ☐ Turn off propane. Move any propane barbeques into the open,
- away from structures.
- ☐ Shut off water and electricity **ONLY IF** officials tell you to do so.
- ☐ Turn on the lights in the house, porch, garage and yard. Inside the house, move combustible materials, such as light curtains and furniture, away from the windows.
- ☐ Place a ladder to the roof in the front of the house.
- ☐ Put lawn sprinklers on the roof of the house and turn on the water.
- ☐ Move all combustibles away from the house, including firewood and lawn furniture.
- ☐ Stay tuned to your local radio station for up-to-date information on the fire and possible road closures.
- ☐ Use travel routes specified by local authorities.

If you have time, or while enroute, call or email your out-of -town contacts. Tell them where you are going and when you expect to arrive. Once you are safe, let them know. Tell them if any family members have become separated.

If possible, leave a note telling others when you left and where you're going. Include contact numbers.

If you go to an evacuation centre, register your personal information at the registration desk.

Do not return home until authorities advise that it is safe.

# FireSmart Landscaping Recommendations for Homeowners

### Remove Points of Ignition

Mow grass (10 centimeters or less)
Remove ground litter, downed trees, and piled debris
Remove over mature, dead and dying trees
Plant fire resistant vegetation
Thin and/or prune existing vegetation
Prune lower branches on conifer trees (within 2 meters from the ground)
Thin conifer stems to 3 m crown spacing

#### Prevent Wildlife Conflicts

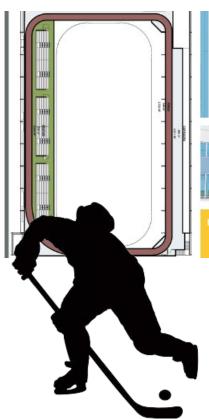
Some plants will attract wildlife. The most prominent example of potential conflict is that of human/bear.

**Fruit Trees:** Pick fruit and allow it to ripen indoors. Do not allow fruit to accumulate on the ground.

If you do not want the fruit, prune the tree vigorously to prevent blossoms, or spray spring blossoms with a garden hose to knock them off.

Make the fruit available to others, share with neighbours or the food bank.

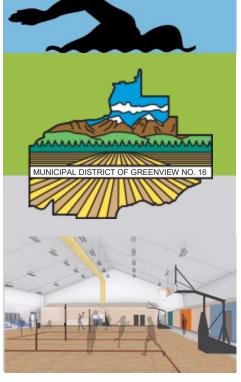

#### **Hydrant Flushing**

Our utilities staff will be out flushing hydrants throughout the warmer months. Quite frequently during the hydrant flushing, we will stir up rust and mineral deposits, this is a good thing, and why we exercise the hydrants, it keeps our lines clean, increases flow in the system, and ultimately keeps the water safe.

We will advise residents on the Town webpage when we conduct this work. We will try to keep the disruption minimal, but please ensure the cold water is clear before doing laundry.

#### Sewage

Just a reminder that the only items that should be flushed is toilet paper, and that which comes out of our bodies. Dental floss, "Flushable wipes", plastics, rubbers, and other items are not to be flushed. These types of items constantly plug and damage the pumps which transport the sewage to the lagoons.

Grease, fat and oils which should also not be disposed of by rinsing down the drain, congeal, solidify and lead to expensive sewer line blockages.

### **Commercial Industrial**

### **Bulk Water Supply**

The Town is able to supply bulk water at the newly upgraded Water Treatment Plant. Our system is a top-fill, with pin pad for users to access their account.

Accounts must be set up at the Town Administration Office. Cost of water is \$10.00 per cubic meter.

#### Sewage Receiving Station

The Town of Fox Creek is anticipating to have the new Sewage Receiving Station operational in the very near future. Users will be able to deposit trucked sewage ONLY at this site.

There is a pin pad that users may access their account. We will be monitoring for any non-sewage material (ie industrial waste, contaminated loads etc.) and fines and clean-up costs may be incurred for violations of Town Bylaws and AEP Regulations. Cost of this service is \$10.75 per cubic meter.
